But bullying, harassment and violence put that safety at risk. The *Bullying. No way!* website gets to the heart of the matter and helps school communities make a positive, long-term difference.

What are bullying, harassment and violence?

We need to be able to recognise harassing and bullying behaviours and understand why and how they happen. **'The issues'** helps school communities identify harmful behaviours and examine the underlying issues. It describes a number of approaches to creating change that can be combined to suit each school community's situation.

Can we make a difference?

Yes we can. Australian school communities are doing great things to create supportive, inclusive school environments that are free from bullying, harassment and violence. **'Ideas box'** describes how school communities are developing environments where people welcome diversity and treat everyone with dignity, fairness and respect.

How can we share what we learn?

'Talk out' includes an interactive area for sharing suggestions and working out solutions to bullying issues. You can join in moderated discussions and find the answers to questions frequently asked by school staff, students and carers.

Where can we go for more information?

'Resources' lists legislation, policies, teaching materials, support services and information sources. These resources have been provided by Australia's state, territory and Commonwealth government education systems, and Catholic and independent education sectors.

How do we get started?

In the 'Ideas box', the **'Schools in action'** section describes strategies that people are using in their own communities to help prevent bullying, harassment and violence. It shows how these initiatives were developed and implemented.

How can young people be an active part of the solution?

'Chill out space' provides young people with facts about bullying and harassment, discrimination and violence. You can learn how to help yourself and your friends at school. You can also make your own contributions to the gallery of artwork, stories or poems.
